1. **Introduction:** The department of Law under Faculty of Legal studies is offering Ph.D. course in the subject of Law w.e.f. academic session 2022-23. Department is offering Ph.D. in several areas of research including Constitutional law, Cyber Law, IPR Law, International Law, Human Rights Law, Law relating to women and child, Labour Law, Family Law, Property Law, Criminal Law, Civil Law, Media Law, Environmental Law and other relevant laws.

As per the Ph.D. ordinance -2020, there is a provision of one semester course work in the related field of research for all candidates admitted through direct admission and Research Eligibility Test (RET) in the full-time or part-time Ph.D. course of the university. The full time/regular and part-time Ph.D. scholar has to do the one semester Ph.D. course work as per the Ph.D. ordinance-2020, before finally admitted to the Ph.D.(full-time/part-time) course.

2. **Scheme of the Course Work:** The course work shall be treated as pre-Ph.D. preparation. It will consist of two parts. The first part comprises of two theory papers. The contents of first paper shall of Research Methodology and Research Ethics and may include quantitative methods, computer applications and other techniques/ methods specific for the broad subject area and research ethics. The second paper would include research topics specific to the candidate's/ supervisors / department's chosen research area. There will be another part of course work consists of literature survey the candidate shall be required to carry out exhaustive literature survey and prepare a review report/ project covering a literature survey of last 10 years in the area specific to the candidate's/supervisor's chosen research area and the prepared review report will be evaluated by an approved external expert.

3. **Evaluation Scheme:** Each of the theory paper of part-A (paper-I and paper-II) shall be of 100 marks. Out of 100 marks allocated to each of the theory paper, 70 marks shall be awarded based on End Semester final written Examination conducted by the University and rest 30 marks in each paper shall be awarded based on two mid semester tests of 15 marks each conducted during the course work. A student shall be required to score minimum 55% marks in each paper [Part-A (Paper-I&II) & Part-B] separately in order to clear the course work. The mid-semester test and evaluation of literature survey will be conducted by the concerned course-coordinator.




