ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

Well-proud of enticing and enrolling, in the Art and Science of the Knowledge, more than half-a-million young-brains, Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University (MJPRU), having NAAC A++ grade is one of the major provincial-universities enjoying the dual character of affiliating and campus jurisdictions in the state of Uttar Pradesh. It is a vibrantly experienced, enthusiastic, and energetic quadragenarian sanctuary of higher education under the legislative control of the state government and deriving, as well, its jurisdictional and academic autonomy from the UP Universities Act, 1973.

With a territorial jurisdiction over nine districts of Western Uttar Pradesh stretching to 31,287 square kilometers and sheltering more than thirty million population – (2,74,35,583 as per census, 2011) – MJPRU is country size educational institution both in terms of area and population.

Apart from its administrative headquarter which is well laid-out to accommodate all the required - both the necessary and desirable ones - facilities like a gigantic administrative block, teaching-infrastructure, library and laboratory structures, auxiliary facilities, and a residential area as well. MJPRU is currently maintaining Campus Faculties and Departments and exercising its jurisdiction over 587 affiliated colleges that prepare the students for graduate, post-graduate, and doctoral degree courses, as well as for many certificate and diploma programmes, in various fields of study and major subjects. It is a truly multi-dimensional and multi-disciplinary university by virtue of having almost all of the major, and minor as well, streams of global knowledge, subjects, disciplines, and courses or programmes either on its Campus or on the premises of the colleges affiliated to it.

It is remarkable to note that MJPRU enrolled a massive amount of students and scholars figuring, for instance, to 5,56,876 during the academic session 2022-23 only. Out of this total student-population of 5,56,876 the Campus-Departments of the university hosted 5,529 brilliant enrolments (ten per cent of the total) under different subject streams at post-graduate, undergraduate, and diploma level courses, the sub-divisions being 1,931 PG, 3,580 UG, and 18 diploma students; whereas the colleges affiliated to the university taught

and trained a noticeable total of 5,51,347 young minds (a whopping ninety per cent of the total student-population), branched into several Faculties and numerous subjects, inter alia, ranging from social sciences, liberal arts, law, languages, commerce, and management to physical and live sciences, engineering and technology, and medical and allied sciences, the course-level segmentation yielding 87,216; 4,63,816; and 315 student-enrolments under the post-graduate, under-graduate, and diploma level courses, respectively. Moreover, as an integral part of its teaching and research activities, scholars have so far been awarded Ph.D. degree in the concerned subjects while research-scholars spread across different departments and colleges are actively pursuing the research work related to the same.

- University has adopted and taken over 14 constituent government colleges which is the highest number in any of the State University.
- Several national and international collaborations and MOU's have been established.
- Online teaching and learning has been promoted to combat and address the challenges such as corona pandemic in the recent past.
- The inauguration of the Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation was done by the Hon'able Governor/ Chancellor Smt. Anandiben Patel.
- A registered Alumni Association was constituted and Alumni meets havebeen conducted regularly.
- Inauguration of the Directorate of Research was done by the Hon'ble Governor/Chancellor Smt. Anandiben Patel.





- Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence has been established in the university.
- Centre of Excellence for Women Studies has been established.
- A Consultancy cell has been established and consultancy policy has been framed, approved and implemented.
- 13. The University promoted and encouraged the students to adopt the concept of "Earn while Learn" and in the process various experimental learning groups in the fields of Hospitality, Legal consultancy, Information and Technology, plantation and Health sector have been established which are fully effective and functional.
- 14. A record number of R & D Projects and Centre of Excellence projects worth Rs 2.0 Crore have been awarded to faculty members in last two years.
- 15. The University achieved a milestone recently where it was ranked second instate in world Edu. Ranking which is an independent ranking autogenerated and not requiring any application for participation towards ranking.
- 16. A student centric "University Students Support Centre (USSC)" has been established where all the students related services e. g. DSW, NSS, Chief Procter and NSS related services are available under one roof.
- Sports facilities have been strengthened and upgraded as a result the sportscomplex is second to none amongst all state Universities.
- Efforts have been made to Regularize the academic calendarwhich has gone out of track due to corona pandemic.
- Several national and state level inter universityathletic and sport events have been organized by the university.
- A Fully developed Directorate of International Relations has been established to structure the international relations and attract foreign students.
- 21. Highly advanced and online Research Management system has been established where all the details pertaining to Ph.D supervisors, Ph.D. thesis, publications, projects, MoUs etc. are available on portal. Online thesis evaluation has enabled to complete the process of thesis evaluation within the stipulated time line.

II. Administrative reforms

- Improvisation of administration bridging gap between University Campus and its affiliated degree colleges.
- Restructuring and upgradation of the university website after a gap ofseveral years.
- A Women Grievance Cell has been established in the university for the first time.
- 25. The University has established a transparent purchase procedure by making all procurement through GeM portal and a fair purchase policy has been framed and implemented after approval.
- 26. A Transparent and fair policy has been developed for financial assistance to faculty members through Teachers Welfare fund (TWF), where for the first time a provision has been made to permit financial assistance to teachers who are going to present a paper in International Conference/Seminar in abroad.
- The Incentive policy has been framed to support and encourage faculty members with an objective to develop healthy work culture.
- A whole system has been installed for waste management.
- Fully functional micro-irrigation system has been established covering about 10 hectare land.
- To encourage faculty members and as a token of appreciation "Shikshak Samman Award" was instituted which are being awarded to deserving faculty members on "Teacher's day" every year since 2021.
- To protect the environment and to make green campus free from pollution electric vehicles have been promoted and a fully developed electric vehicles and Mobile charging Centre has been established.
- For the benefit of faculty and students MoUs have been signed with various banks such BOB, HDFC etc. and e-branches of these have been established in the University.
- 33. Online "College Management System" has been established where all the information related to practical examinations, examiners, number of practical examinations allocated to particular examiner and number of examinations conducted by examiner, all such details are available and can be viewed, which has introduced transparency in

- the examinations process. This system has been highly appreciated by Hon'ble Chancellor/Governor and has directed that same be followed by other Universities as well.
- Panchal Museum has been upgraded and converted to completely digital high-tech. Museum and has been appreciated in mass by viewers/visitors.

Social Reforms

- MJPRU adopted many villages and helped in providing assistance to them during corona pandemic.
- For providing Priceless social services through NSS a student received a highest award/medal from Hon'ble President of India.
- 37. A Day-Care centre has been established.
- 38. University upgraded Pt. Deenanath School and management was registered through Society act. The school is now run by the management constituted as per rules and at present this school is second to none as for as Schools of UP Board are concerned in district Bareilly.

- The University extending its social responsibilities adoped Disha School for Divyangjan and is intended to develop it as a school from KG to PG.
- 40. The university adopted large number of TB patients and nutrition and medicines were provided to patients. Many of the patients have already cured and many are under treatment.
- Recognizing its social responsibilities, the University provided Nutrition to large number of pregnant women below poverty line.
- 42. The University established a fully developed and functional Health care Centre having quality infrastructure coupled with digital-ray Machine. To have effective output the University signed a MoU with Rajshree Medical college, Bareilly and doctors are available in health care centre from Rajshree college round the clock. The health care centre is open to all and with the help of local administration various blood donation camps and health care camps are being organized regularly.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

a. Curriculum Design and Development

In light of the vision and mission statement of the university and the objectives of the government education mission (NEP-2020), the university is progressively recording excellence in education, research and innovation by developing state-of-art infrastructure and collaborating with organizations of national and international repute to provide a globally acclaimed educational environment to students of Rohilkhand region and nurturing the budding talents up to the full potential coupled with the inculcation of human values to become a responsible citizen and a valuable asset for the nation. The university is honoured to have many central as well as state ministers, industrialists, and sports persons of national/international repute as alumni of the university.

MJPRU imparts education through its six faculties, 24 departments offering 50 programmes covering a broad range of disciplines and promoting inter-disciplinary learning thereby creating a wide hub of the knowledge-based educational system.

The University was the first one (in the state) to adopt National Education Policy- 2020 in the curriculum and accordingly various Cells and Directorates were established.

Keeping in mind the societal and regional needs of 9 districts and with the objective of broadening the

scope and coverage of its educational delivery system many professional/language programmes have also been initiated in tune with the policies of the state and nation.

Justifying its role as an affiliating university, it provided effective leadership to colleges in developing need-based programs/curricula where more than 46 BOS were conducted in 2021 for revision of the UG syllabus.

The university is continuously and rigorously working on the design, development and adoption of course curriculum as per local, regional, national and international requirements where effective participation of every stakeholder including industry and society is also ensured, which is well reflected in the curriculum. To preserve the local/regional historical and cultural heritage Panchal Museum has been established, which apart from generating awareness in masses has provided a fillip to the research work related to Panchal and Rohilkhand region. The university achieved various milestones on the academic front in the last five years by establishing various Cells/Directorates/Centres and a few of these are enlisted below which cater to the local/national/lobal requirements, like: -

- Pandit Deendayal Upadhyay Shodhpeeth
- Centre of Excellence for Multilingual Studies
- Centre of Excellence for Women Studies Indo-Iranian Studies Centre
- > Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence

The systematic curricula development process begins with exploring requirements of impactful relevant knowledge, current needs and future trends of industry from local to global level with the effective participation of leaders of society (Academic/Social/Political/Industrial) along with our valuable alumni and students. All inputs are reviewed and evaluated and relevant ones are incorporated into the curriculum by adopting established statutory provisions.

Curriculum design and modification is always in tune with UGC/AICTE/NCTE/BCI/PCI guidelines and are well reflected in POs and PSOs, which are instrumental factors in designing the curriculum and keeping these into consideration the COs and academic layering leads to the development of curriculum. Thus POs, PSOs and COs, clearly reflect the intent of catering to local, regional, national or some global requirement.

b. Curriculum Enrichment

In order to integrate the cross-cutting issues relevant to Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, and Professional Ethics, the institution has imbibed different types of courses in the curriculum such as the Indian Constitution, Professional Ethics/Environmental Studies/ sports, etc. in many UG / PG programs. The students are given ample opportunities to be part of such activities and be able to make all these part of their social/ professional life.

c. Environment and Sustainability:

According to the Sustainable Development Goals Report 2021, released by the United Nations, many countries and communities are recognizing the need to make intensive efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to overcome the bad impact of the COVID-19 pandemic which many people across the globe have faced. According to the report, to get the SDGs back on track, governments, cities, businesses, and industries have to make the best possible efforts to adopt low- carbon, resilient and inclusive development pathways that will reduce carbon emissions, conserve natural resources, create better jobs, advance gender equality and tackle growing inequities.

In order to sensitize students about the environment and sustainability, a number of courses are being taught and activities such as seminars, guest lectures, industry visits, and field excursions are also being organized.

Human Values:

A number of activities accommodating human values have been conducted ranging from working in old age homes, and NGOs, to organizing blood donation camps, health check-up camps organizing lectures by experts, spiritual gurus, and luminaries to inculcate social, moral, and ethical values in the students. Many of the courses nurturing human values and professional ethics are included in the curriculum at UG and PG levels. To enrich the curriculum, various new programmes have also been initiated.

Professional Ethics:

In order to inculcate best ethical practices among the students, several courses are included in the curricula. Perceptions of students on professional ethics have been enriched by exposing them not only through the curriculum but also through different kinds of activities such as seminars, workshops, and lectures by eminent scholars with a view to imbibe and practice moral values in their profession. The professional ethics and its related activities in all programs offered by the university within its premises are aimed to:

- Make the students responsible researchers by educating them with professional/ research ethics, codes of ethics, social ethics, and industrial standards to promote quality education and research, and in the process the university has mandated each research paper, thesis, and project including student's projects to be checked for plagiarism prior to final submission.
- Enrich the students by providing enough exposure to enlighten society through collective professionalism, citizen's duties, and intellectual property rights.

Gender Justice:

A dedicated "Proctorial Board", "Anti Ragging Cell" and "Women Grievance Cell" is available to take care of women's welfare and gender justice within the University premises as well as hostels. Apart from offering a programme entitled "PG Diploma in Women empowerment and Development", The University is also offering two certificate programmes namely "Women Leadership and Empowerment" and "Women Rights and Legal Awareness".

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

University organizes an orientation program for newly admitted students of different courses. This helps students to know the institution, rules, and regulations of courses, facilities on the campus, dos and don'ts, etc. Frequent workshops and seminars are arranged on different student-centric issues like ragging, drug menace, safe driving practices, etc.

Students are also given training on soft skills management by experts. Workshops are arranged with hands on sessions to improve students' communication and writing skills. Experts from Industry/Academia are invited for lectures to inculcate awareness about relevant issues.

On the basis of internal assessment, performance in the examination, and interaction in classroom activities, slow and advanced learners are identified. Students getting less than 50% marks are placed in the slow learners' category and those with more than 80% marks are in advanced learners' class.

Slow Learners:

- During the course of the study, 20-25 students are assigned to a mentor faculty for counseling and guidance.
- The mentor identifies their problems and weak areas. Based on this analysis, they make efforts to motivate the students, monitor their academic performance, and assist in the learning process by giving them inputs in form of notes, handouts, online resources, etc.
- Extra efforts are made in teaching slow learners to bring them to par with others. They are encouraged to peer learning among the group of their batch mates.
- Tutorial classes are also organized for the students on motivation, confidence-building, and mental well-being.
- Teachers revise the tough topics as per the student's requirements and provide a question bank & discuss the way of presenting the answers in the examination to score good marks.
- Extra classes are organized to clarify their doubts.
 Critical topics are revisited through classroom seminars.
- Remedial classes are arranged according to their scores/grades obtained in the specific subjects.





Advanced Learners:

- Such students are encouraged to organize technical events, and other extracurricular activities and asked to represent in events organized in and outside the university.
- Various club activities are conducted to mold the students' interest in the corresponding field.
- Extra efforts are made for the students who wish to participate in technical and cultural fests of renowned Institutions.
- Students are encouraged to take up micro/minor projects to gain research orientation and practical experience.
- They are motivated to participate in industrial training/internships for better employability
- They are encouraged to participate in community services like legal assistance to vulnerable people, and medical camps for neighborhood areas. etc which boosts their confidence and prepares them for a future role as responsible citizens.
- Students are advised to use e-learning portals for enhancing knowledge. They are also guided to write articles on scientific/social topics for publication.
- Bright students are encouraged and inspired to get university ranks, and set higher goals like preparation for competitive exams and research fellowships.
- University rank holders are encouraged by convocation ceremony, where the Governor of Uttar Pradesh blesses them with certificates/gold medals.

The level of students is again assessed at the end of the semester/examination and categorization is done accordingly.

MJPRU has multi-disciplinary departments like Computer science & information technology, Electronics & Communication, Electronics & Instrumentation, Electrical Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Pharmacy, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Humanities, Ancient History, Regional Economics, Adult Continuing Education & Extension, Animal Science, Plant Science, Business administration, Hotel Management, B.Ed./M.Ed., Clinical Psychology, PGDCA, English, Philosophy, MSW and LAW. The MJPRU has most of the engineering branches, and based on that, it can be true to say that it is a technical University. The university encourages intensive use of Information Communication Technology (ICT)- enabled tools, including online resources for effective teaching

and learning. Most of the teachers of the University are using ICT tools and resources available on the campus. They use LCD Projectors, Video conferencing, laptops, Google quizzes, and e- learning technology. A separate computer center is established on the campus in 2004, where resources by Leased line, Multimedia Projectors, Digital cameras, Computers, Printers, Laptop, Wi-fi, LAN connected systems are also used by the faculties and students.

There are 100% ICT-enabled classrooms, and most of the departments have smart classrooms, too, on the campus. The laboratories, seminar halls, auditorium, senate conference room, and other conference rooms are well-equipped with ICT facilities. The computer center helps the teachers in developing e-content in different subjects. The computer center was developed to meet the learning demands of engineering students. The center developed e-learning content and special lectures and technical talks are also arranged by inviting experts from the industry. The university computer or e-Learning center periodically conducts a workshop for teachers, students & research scholars enrolled under MJPRU.

Most of the teachers have created WhatsApp groups for their classes by which they share reading material such as lecture notes, ppts, word files, PDF files, JPG images, short videos, photos, e-books, etc., which cannot be accessed by the students in general.

Faculty members suggest and encourage the students to use e-pathshala, inflibnet, delnet, Swayam e- portal, and e-content on the university website & digital library developed by the higher education department of Uttar Pradesh, massive online courses, developed by MHRD, New Delhi, and for textbooks, reference books, etc. National Digital Library of India, developed by Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur.

During the covid-19, almost all faculty members of the university upgraded themselves with online teaching. Faculty members prepared lectures and uploaded them to the university website as well as on the e-contents library developed by the higher education department of Uttar Pradesh, which was made easily available to the students for offline study.

Students can access the e-catalog of books through KOHA Software. The links for e-journals, e-books, e-newspapers, and e-thesis/dissertations are also available on the university website in that library domain to the readers for free access. The central Library also offers a wide range of e-resources which are extended 24x7 services via remote access facilities





to all stakeholders. General ICT Tools used by MJPRU faculties are: Desktop, laptops, SPSS, CAD-CAM, Ex-Pharma, LCD/LED Projector, Digital cameras, Printer, Photocopier, Tablets, Pen drive, Scanners, Microphones, Interactive white boards, DVDs and CDs etc.

Examination Reforms:

University is dedicated to imparting quality education through a transparent system of examination and evaluation for which a dedicated web portal is available with a login facility to teachers, officials, and students of the University. The processes related to the conduct of examination, evaluation, declaration of results, and award of Degrees/Diplomas/Certificates are managed and supervised by the office of the Controller of Examination. The Conduct of the examination of more than 6 lakh students is a challenge in itself, and the University has, over the years, successfully performed this task with some major reforms in the examination and evaluation process. A College Management System Software has been developed to facilitate the appointment of the practical examiners, which has resulted in the smooth conduct of examinations in a scheduled time frame. These reforms can be categorized under the following heads.

Examination Process:

The University strictly follows the Ordinance for the conduct of examinations in a transparent and foolproof manner. The crucial steps taken by the University in the above direction include:

- Centralized conduct of mid-semester and endsemester examinations at the department and university Levels.
- Online portal for filling the Examination forms, payment facility for examination fees with the help of secured payment gateway.
- Dedicated College Management System with the help of software for the selection of examiners in a transparent manner.
- Each program and course is identified with the help of unique codes.
- Two sets of question papers are set by the examiners from the panel given by the Board of Studies of each subject.
- The datasheet is finalized at least one month before the examination and uploaded to the University website.
- A continuous assessment process is adopted through Internal assessment through tests, quizzes, assignments, and seminars.

- The back Paper facility is provided in all courses.
- A dissertation / Research project Report has been made mandatory for developing research aptitude in students.
- Admission to various programs is made on the basis of Entrance Tests.
- Research Management System (RMS) has been developed for transparent online admissions in Ph.D Programs.
- Online monitoring through CCTV surveillance has been made mandatory for free and fair examination.

Evaluation Procedure:

- A central evaluation pattern with proper monitoring is adopted for the timely declaration of results.
- Bar-coding is done on answer books for maintaining the confidentiality of the Evaluation Process.
- Scanning of answer books before and after evaluation for the transparent evaluation process.
- Completion of Evaluation and declaration of results in a time-bound manner.
- The online Challenge Evaluation process for the students is in practice, and hundred percent of the cases have been resolved.

Degree/ Diploma / Certificate:

- Degree /Diploma / Certificate is issued to the passout students after convocation.
- Verification of Mark sheet and Degree through an online portal.
- Bar-coding on the Degree / Diploma and Certificate.
- Water Mark with anti-piracy features on the Mark sheets and Degree certificates.
- At one period of time the University was at the top position in India in uploading documents on DigiLocker and presently it is among the top three Organisatyions.

RESEARCH, INNOVATIONS AND EXTENSION

The University has a researcher-responsive, modernized research policy to encourage high quality rigorous, comprehensive research duly approved by the Honourable Chancellor. The research facilities are regularly reviewed and updated to support the undergoing research work as under-.

The Directorate of Research (DoR) is established to conduct workshops and activities for newly appointed supervisors and their scholars through its well-



developed automated Research Management System (RMS).

The Centre of Excellence & Shodh Peeth: established with funding from the U.P. State Government, the University has established Pt. Deen Dayal Shodh Peeth and Centre of Excellence in various Departments viz, Plant Science, Applied and Regional Economics, MBA, Education, and Animal Science, Applied Chemistry etc. that facilitate knowledge creation and dissemination in their respective disciplines.

INNOVATIVE RESEARCH GRANT (IRG)- of the university motivates the regular faculty of the university and its affiliated colleges to conduct innovative research. The policy accelerates inter-faculty/college collaboration in emerging areas that will support the receivers with a sum of Rs.5.0 lacs of rupees to conduct the projects in a science discipline and Rs.2 lacs in Social Sciences and Humanities discipline.

The University with its Policy for Direct Admission in Ph.D. Programs invite online applications for direct admission to the Ph.D. (Full time) program in the Academic year, for the candidates having fellowship with them at the State/National level. The university has also started offering Part-time Ph.D. in different subjects as per clauses 3.1 and 4.5 of the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) Ordinance 2020.

Research Initiatives for Award of D.Sc./ D.Litt.-The university has come up with newly created regulations and guidelines to strengthen the research level by pursuing the above degree through high- quality publication and application-based studies for the use of the different stakeholders.

To catalyze the research in the Self-sustained institutions, the Policy of Recognition of the Research Institutes and Self-Sustained Affiliated Institutions as Research Centers is also executed in the university. The university provides a Facility for data analysis in the department of MBA that has an advanced data science tool- SPSS, to facilitate research through data computing and analysis.

Central Library: is well equipped with e-resources, journals, and computers that facilitate access and use of databases and e-resources to researchers.

Commendation of the Teachers- The University felicitates teachers for achieving prestigious research projects and programs and doing research publications by various national and international bodies.

Research Collaboration- University has an open policy to collaborate individually and institutionally with Local NGOs, National Institutions, Foreign Universities, and Scientific & Educational Institutions. The Incentive to the teachers- The university provides the teacher travel support to participate in National and International Seminars / Conferences who have been invited to deliver a lecture or present his/her work as a selected paper in the global arena.

To facilitate the smooth project conduction in the university by the different project investigators, the DoR has developed a uniform policy that will streamline the process and make the conduction of projects an easy process.

Innovation Ecosystem

The MJP Rohilkhand University, Bareilly, is committed to providing a conducive and vibrant ecosystem for innovations, creation, and transfer of knowledge through initiatives such as the Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation (RIF) established in the university campus under section 8 of the company act 2013. RIF is a Not-for-Profit Centre dedicated to nurturing Innovation, Incubation, and Entrepreneurship. It is a nationally connected framework for innovators and faculties from inside and outside the University, The Directorate of Research (DoR) has been established to create an environment in the university to foster a research culture and provide an efficient support system for researchers. DoR has initiated direct rolling over admissions for JRF/fellowship holders, under this, every two-three-month direct admission after the interview is given in the Ph.D. program. Another initiative of part-time Ph.D., especially for working professionals, has also been initiated. Besides all the above programs, DoR conducts a Research Entrance Test (RET) in May-June every year for all Ph.D. 'Pt. Deendayal Upadhyay Shodhpeeth' was established and funded by Uttar Pradesh Government in MJPRU on 23/01/2018. Since its inception, this research chair is continuously engaged in various activities of seminars, discussions, and research based on the ideas of Pandit Deendayal Ji. Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence (ACAI), established in the university, has received a grant of Rs 21.5 lakhs through the Center of Excellence scheme from the government of Uttar Pradesh, it provides the opportunity for potential researchers of different disciplines to carry out research for the benefit of the society in Rohilkhand region as well as for the nation, It serves as a platform for the research of different disciplines. ACAI contributes to agriculture, smart city, health care, education, etc. The Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence is playing an important role in the knowledge-driven growth of the region based on innovation. The primary focus of the Grassroots Innovation Centre (GRIC) is to encourage the students to come up with new innovative ideas leading to





entrepreneurial skills and prepare them as per the need of the industry. More specifically, in the field of innovation and startup support, it focuses on six primary areas as education, technology, healthcare and Ayurveda, Art and Craft, tourism, and social entrepreneurship.

An Intellectual Property Right Cell has been created in the University to provide a suitable environment for the creation and protection of intellectual property and to coordinate the activities concerning the Intellectual Property of the University and its affiliated Colleges. IPR Cell, in association with other agencies, organized seminars, and workshops, to publicize the importance of IPR among the teaching community of the University and affiliated colleges. This Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) policy of the University is framed to promote a competitive and competent environment for both the curiosity- driven and market-driven research and development activities conducted at the University level so as to protect the creation of original works of authorship.

Consultancy

The MJP Rohilkhand University has personnel with varied specializations and expertise, which can be of immense help to industries, academia, and other organizations by way of imparting consultancy services. Keeping in mind, the intellectual and technical strength of the university, growing awareness about the innovative research of commercial value and the need for collaboration with other organizations for mutual benefits, and building strategic alliances for educational, socio-economic, and technological growth, the Consultancy rules have been formulated, approved and adopted by the University. The policy highlights the rules regarding consultancy to help the academic and non- academic staff of the university and its affiliated colleges to offer consultancy to government, public, and private sector organizations, communities, groups, and corporates.

Different "Directorates" and Cells/Centres" were established to attain the well-defined objectives ingrained in the consultancy policy of the University. The "Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation (RIF)" in the university helps to provide consultancy services to a wide range of organizations, such as private and public sector organizations, cooperative societies, and financial institutions. RIF is focused on providing speed and faster advancement to new ventures, and incubatees for successful commercialization of technology/products through a combination of Accelerator Program, Alumni Connect, Corporate Market Access, Academic Wisdom, Mentoring and Training Programs, Seed

Capital, Infrastructure, Expert Advisors, Office Space & Equipment, Technological Facilities, Initial Growth Funds from Angel Investors.

The Directorate of Research (DoR) was established to create an enabling environment in the university and its affiliated colleges to foster a research culture. It is the vision of our university to provide an efficient and effective support system to facilitate faculty members and researchers in their research activities and timely completion of their research degree or externally funded research/consultancy projects. The "Innovative Research Grant (IRG)" has been initiated to grant funds for projects to promote research activities among teachers. To accelerate the research processes, an online "Research Management System (RMS)" facility has been developed at the university. The RMS is an automated platform for the complete research process. For providing consultancy services in the form of "Recognition to Research Centre" to affiliated and aided colleges, University offers research assistance in various subjects in interdisciplinary areas leading to the Degrees of Ph.D. For developing healthy and smooth functioning of consultancy services for the industries, the university established the Directorate of Social and Corporate Relations (DSR). For attracting foreign consultancy, the university established the Directorate of International Relation (DIR), which comprehensively promote an understanding of constructing international relations policy for education and other allied areas. The DIR facilitates individuals and institutions to collaborate and execute international issues. The Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence (ACAI) actively involves in promoting Al-based research and development in the field of Agriculture, health, remote sensing, etc.

Extension Activities

The MJP Rohilkhand University, Bareilly, inculcates social value and responsibilities in the faculty members and students by undertaking extension activities in the neighbourhood for the holistic development of society. During each academic year, several extension activities are regularly carried out by the NSS unit, Directorates, Departments, and Cells. In addition, outreach programs and invited lectures (especially by eminent scientists from India and abroad), and educational visits of the university students to the villages are also organized.

The National Service Scheme (NSS): Several activities like Tuberculosis patient care programs, Malaria Eradication programs, Blood Donation camps, COVID-19 Vaccination Utsav, Health, Hygiene and Sanitation, and Counselling during COVID-19 were organized. Tuberculosis Patient





Care Program: The university is running TB patient DOTS/ADR monitoring care program through our self-financed zero TB digital platform in collaboration with the health department (UP). More than 180 TB patients have become fully well and healthy through DOTS monitoring with personal caring of 25 patients and one village. (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/health_care.aspx). This program organized TB awareness programs in different villages like Sarsa, Dohra, Lalpur , and Dohria. Malaria Eradication Programmes: The teachers and students are creating proper awareness in the villages against communicable diseases (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/health_care.aspx).

Blood Donation Camps (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/healthcare.aspx): A number of Blood Donation Camps have been organised regularly by different departments, cells, units of university, independently or in Collaboration with Indian Medical Association Bareilly. COVID-19 Vaccination Utsav was organised on 14 April 2021, as part of the vaccination drive at University Health Centre, MJP Rohilkhand University, Bareilly. Counselling during COVID-19: The University appointed counsellor provided counselling from07/04/2020 to the students/stakeholders suffering from post-covid psychological symptoms. (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/health_care.aspx_)

Pandit Deendayal Upadhyay Shoodh peeth: Since its inception, this research chair is continuously engaged in various activities of the seminar, discussion, and research based on the ideas of Pandit Deendayal ji (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/Pt_DeenDayal.aspx).

Pt. Deenanath Mishra Inter college for children from weaker and marginalized sections- This school was adopted by the university in the year 1996 and, since then, has provided them with regular care in finance, manpower, management, teaching, etc.

Panchal Museum- To preserve the local heritage of the Rohilkhand region, the "Panchal Museum" has been established. The museum is enriched with sculptures, paintings, old coins, fighting tools, mummies, different types of fossils from Rohilkhand regions, etc. The museum is open to all visitors during office time. (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/panchaal_museum.aspx).

Women Grievance Cell (WGC)- WGC regularly organizes gender sensitization and skill-based workshops, webinars, and seminars through the "Mission Shakti" program to make aware the girls and women from the nearby districts and affiliated/aided colleges about their

rights at working place as well as in the public places https://www.mjpru.ac.in/WGCgalleria.aspx).

Teacher's reskilling cell (TRC)- The TRC at MJPRU has been entrusted with the training/reskilling/upskilling responsibilities of the university and its affiliated aided colleges to benefit the teaching community (https://www.mjpru.ac.in/TRCell.aspx).

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The goal of University is to continuously enhance the learning environment for its students by offering adequate facilities for teaching-learning, and research processes. University complies with all regulations set forth by the governing bodies such as AICTE, UGC, NCTE, BCI, NCTE, and PCI concerning the infrastructure needed for education, administration, and amenities. To facilitate teaching-learning, and research processes, classrooms, laboratories, library, and computing equipment available are as follows:

Classroom

University has an adequate number of spacious, ventilated, and well-furnished classrooms for teaching theory courses. There are 24 departments with 85 classrooms having ICT Facilities. University has 19 Seminar Rooms/ Auditoriums equipped with state-of-the-art facilities. Most of the departments have seminar halls equipped with addressing systems and ICT-enabled facilities that can be used for teaching, conducting conferences, workshops, and academic activities.

Laboratories:

There are 110 laboratories/workshops present in the various departments of the university. All laboratories are well maintained for carrying out curriculum-oriented lab practical and research activities. The laboratories are designed with safety features imbibed in the infrastructure. The main laboratories in the University for the various disciplines include Psychology Lab, Health & Physical Education Resource Centre, Language Lab., Chemical Process Lab., Power Electronics Lab., Product Design/PCB Lab, etc. University is also recognized as a nodal centre for accessing virtual lab facilities provided by IIT, Roorkee.

Library

University has a central library with an automation facility that helps the students and faculty strengthen their academic and research work. The faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Management, and Faculty of Education have their separate library with subject concerned books. Apart from that, most departments also have an in-





house, subject-specific library with specialized books, Magazines, and periodicals. The library has the facility of digital cataloging with a total number of 74045 books, 857 E- books accessible through University website, 89,303,258 E-books accessible through NDL Website, 10107 Thesis / Dissertations: and 1999 Journals/ Periodicals. There are separate sections of different newspapers (both national and international) and magazines in the library. Apart from this there are approximately 65,000 books available in departmental libraries.

Computing Equipment

University has adequate facilities related to computing equipment, such as 2 km OFC LAN, UTM, High- End Servers, Routers, Switches, Servo, UPS, 731 computers, and 190 printers. University has provided a centralized internet facility through a 1Gbps leased line. One drone camera q4c-HD and one wireless sensor network-based IoT tool kit are present in the university. University also has solar panels to generate 1 Mega Watt. of electricity on its own.

Research Facilities

University has The Directorate of Research with an automated Research Management System. Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence is used by the students to carry out research inclusive of AI. Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation and Grassroots Innovation Centre help students to work in the area of startup and Innovation.

Other Facilities

A well-established DSW office, Training, and Placement facility, Proctorial Board, Grievance Cell, Consultancy Cell, Centre of Excellence for Women Studies, Centre of Excellence for Multilingual Studies, Indo –Iranian study centre, Gurukul (outdoor classroom), etc., are other important units of the university.

The University aims at the holistic development of its students. The indoor and outdoor sports and games facilities are provided to both girls and boys. Students participate in Inter- Institute, Inter- University, State, National, Asian, and International level competitions. University organizes different cultural activities like Yoga Day, sports day, and a fest on the occasion of foundation day of the University, which provides an opportunity to students and employees for exploring their talent and creativity.

Sports Facilities:

The University provides students with a number of opportunities to maintain a healthy and active lifestyle while pursuing academic goals. The university has the various facilities related to Sports and Games.

Yoga Centre

The University has a yoga center, which organizes many Yoga Camps for the students to sharpen their intellect, and improve concentration and physical fitness. Every year on June 21, International yoga day is celebrated to create awareness among the students, teachers, officers, and non-teaching staff. Students participate in National and State Level Yoga competitions every year.

Gymnasium:

The University has a Gymnasia, which fulfills all the sporting needs of the players. Qualified trainers are available in the gymnasium for the training of students. About 50 students visit the Gymnasia every day.

Sports Injury Centre

Keeping in view the injuries of players in mind, the Sports Injury and Rehabilitation Centre has been set up by the University. In this apart from trained supporting staff many equipments have been installed (Ultrasonic, Tens Ceragem, Laser, CPM, etc.). On an average 15 students visit the centre to get the treatment daily. Two trained Physiotherapists have been appointed to take care of them.

Campus at a Glance

The University has a lush green campus spread over 206.7 acres with one main gate, two others entry gates, which facilitate easy accesibility of stakeholders. With easy access to the local transportation, the university campus is situated in the centre of the city. The university promotes the outdoors trees and plants of various species (presently these belong to 38 families) have been planted all over the campus to create a welcoming atmosphere.

- It has a magnificent administrative block in the centre with a university semicircle having the grand statue of Mahatma Jyotiba Phule ji to give significance to Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, which provide a mesmerising moment to each visitor of the university. University has more than 20 buildings for teaching & research departments.
- University has an open Sports Stadium, an Indoor Sports Complex. The sports stadium of the university regularly organizes national and state level events. A Gymnasium matching up to International Standards and 5 open gym facility are also available in the campus. University also has a Botanical Garden and Animal House for experiment and research.
- All the departments have friendly environment for especially abled persons having ramps to provide





access to the departments. Each department has separate restrooms for female staff members and students. A girl's common room and Centre of Excellence for Women Studies are also present in the campus. Women Grievance Cell office available with the university helps girls' students to resolve their issues.

- There are five boy's hostels in the campus namely BDA boys hostel, PG and Research boys hostel, Nana Ji Deshmukh boys hostel, Mains boys hostel and New boys hostel having the residential capacity of 880 boys. There are four girls hostels in the campus namely Maitreyi girls hostel, Savitri girls hostel, Laxmibai Kelkar girls hostel and Manorama girls hostel having residential capacity of 459 girls. University also has Residential quarters of different categories for university employees.
- The campus also contains University Health centre that is linked with Rajshree Medical college, Bareilly. It provides OPD facility to the students and employees of the university. Various health check-up and blood donation camps are organised by the university in time-to-time manner. Ambulance facility is also available in the campus.
- University has a Temple, playground, nursery, Students' Canteen, Staff Canteen, Day care centre, and a Multi-purpose Hall.University also has a centre of study of Mahatma Jyotiba Phule ji, to cry out the research related to him. A Security Office is also present in the main administrative building.
- The University has separate buildings for Banks, Post Office, Employment Bureau, and Panchal Museum making the campus a self-sufficient unit.

IT policy

The academic, administrative, examination, and research operations of the university rely heavily on its IT infrastructure. The IT infrastructure serves as the hub of all functions of university viz admission, examination, finance, academics, etc. The IT infrastructure is improved and maintained as a matter of routine. The University computer centre is a nodal point of the university which provides IT facilities to the university to strengthen the infrastructure and effective teaching-learning process.

MJPRU is an ICT-driven institution that aims to offer cutting-edge, top-notch IT infrastructure. There are cutting-edge IT facilities at the university, including Wi-Fi that is available throughout the entire campus. The university features a 2 km fiber-optic cable network infrastructure that connects all buildings and blocks in

various laboratories with UTM with Firewall, High End Servers, Router, 16 port, 24 port and 48 port Switches, Servo, UPS, 731 computers, and 190 printers.On the campus of the university and in its hostels, students are free to use their mobile phones, tablets, or laptops to access the internet. The university campus is internet enabled and provides centralized internet facilities through 1Gbps line and wi- fi to the computer labs, departments, teachers' chambers, administrative offices, and Central Library to keep pace with current trends in Higher Education. The internet enabled campus allows teachers and students to access online resources viz., live databases, and online journals. University owns various licensed system and software, open source software and subject specific software. The ICT equipment also includes various hardwares and staff biometric attendance module. CCTV cameras are installed in important building for surveillance.

The university has a clear IT policy that outlines what sensitive information is within the university and how it should be protected. IT policy describe the norms for software and hardware usage, Network (Internet & Intranet) Usage, Email Account Usage, university database usages and website hosting. All internal university data is covered by policy as an asset. Each employee is accountable for safeguarding confidential information (Paper records or digital files) that the possession of the employee.

IT infrastructure is upgraded every year and the budget for the same is provided through financial assistance from UGC, RUSA, TEQIP, etc. At the beginning of every academic year need based assessment for replacement / up-gradation / augmentation of the existing infrastructure is carried out based on the feedback from Heads of the departments, technical staff, and system administrator. After assesing curriculum requirements, computer-student ratio, budget constraints, working condition of the existing equipments and also students' suggestions necessary course of action is taken.

Maintenance and utilization of physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The maintenance of facilities improves the stability and gives longevity of the infrastructure. It is an essential routine requirement for maintaining and up keeping the facilities in healthy and good condition.

All type of infrastructure whether educational departments or staff quarters need regular maintenance to keep it in good and working condition.





MJPRU has a dedicated Central Maintenance Cell (CMC) for providing the prompt maintenance services to the university. This cell provides all type of electrical and civil services to various departments of university as well as quarters in the campus of university. Electrical section of university consists of a Junior Engineer who is the In-charge and have dedicated staff for carrying out all type of electrical works like supply of electricity to various departments, hostels, campus quarters, routine maintenance of all electrical appliances like installation of repair of fans, exhaust, indoor and outdoor lighting system of the university including hostels and guarters. Roof top solar power panels are installed in the university, which is maintained by electrical maintenance team of the university. All the generators available in the university are operated and maintained by this team as and when required. The civil maintenance section of university is headed by an Assistant Engineer along with a dedicated team for civil works. This group takes care for works like cleanliness, providing water supply, masonry and carpentry works of for all the departments of university, hostels, and quarters inside the premises of campus. This team also maintain the cleanliness of parking areas, gardens, stadium and guest house of university. Tube wells exists in the university, which are operated and maintained by this group to meet the water requirement of university as well as to the staff residing in the quarters of university. Horticulture work of the university is taken care by the civil section of the university.

University provides the contingencies for maintenance work of electrical, civil nature and also for maintenance of gardens. University has defined standards of practice for carrying out the maintenance work in order to have a smooth work flow and maintain good condition of its infrastructure. Dedicated staff in respective maintenance sections is working in collaboration to render the prompt services and maintain the facilities and infrastructure in good condition.

University has an open Sports Stadium, an Indoor Sports Complex. A Gymnasium and 5 open gym facility are also available in the campus. The University sports council maintains these facilities and hosts a variety of events all year long. Together, the association and support staff manage a variety of sporting events and meet needs of many sports. Central Library of the university is maintained and enhanced by a supporting team that includes an honorary librarian. Faculty Libraries and other Department Libraries are maintained by the concern department that include a Professor In-charge.

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The student council of MJP Rohilkhand University provides students with the chance to acquire leadership skills by planning and carrying out events that cater to their technical, cultural, social, recreational, and other academic interests on campus. In addition to organizing activities, the student council works to foster better academic environments by collaborating with professors and institution management to share ideas, concerns, and interests. A student council serves as a forum for all students and actively promotes a better learning environment by working with teachers and mentors. The student council promotes students' sense of personal responsibility.

In light of student perception, opinions and suggestions are considered when making decisions. The institute works to promote a student's overall growth. Students are members of professional societies, including IEEE and ACM, etc. They support the planning of conferences, workshops, and seminars. Additionally, they participate in community events, cultural activities, sports, debates, and competitions. In mentor groups, students are also permitted to provide input on other activities, including teaching, learning, and research at the department level. Through these councils, students can raise their complaints and engage in open discussion. Additionally, students may be nominated to serve on disciplinary, antiragging and IQAC committees.

The following are the different venues where students participate or where their participation is sought:

System of Class Representatives:

Under each programme, each class of students will elect a boy and a girl to serve as the CR and GCR, respectively. Regular CR meetings are held with the Class Coordinators, Heads of Departments, and Deans/ Directors.

Student Club Participation: The institution hosts a variety of departmental groups. These groups are supervised and run by student representatives under the direction of faculty members. Students plan several events throughout the year and effectively carry them out. Students are promoted to associate with cultural, sports, and technical committees as a volunteer to organize these events successfully. Other celebrations include foundation day, "Engineers Day," fresher's Party, and Farewell Party, among others.

Internal Complaint Committee (ICC): An internal complaint committee is established at the University to look into the student's grievances. Three girl students





are nominated who represent the female community of the University in this body. The nominated girls, female faculty members, and two non- teaching staff members spread awareness about the functioning of the cells throughout the campus. Resident Boys' and Girls' Hostel Representatives:

They serve on the hostel mess committee, which oversees food service and other matters. The hostel mess committee creates a weekly mess menu.

Training and Placement Representatives:

Placement representatives from the pre-final year of the programme are nominated during the placement drives. These representatives are actively involved in the placement process and execute it smoothly.

NSS:

NSS is also encouraged in the institute enabling the student to participate in service activities like organizing blood donation camps, plantation, rural health, sanitation, adult education, and environmental awareness camps in the neighboring areas as a social responsibility.

Alumni Engagement

Rohilkhand University Alumni Association (RUAA) brings former students together to maintain a connection with their university and fellow graduates. RUAA is approved by the Executive Council held on 08.12.2020 resolution 6.02 Sub clause 06.02.7. RUAA got established and registered under the Society Registration Act No. 21, 1860, with registration number BAR/02984/2021-2022. The alumni association has contributed a substantive amount of Rupees 1 crore 31 Lakhs.

During the last five years, the University has held four alumni meetings and six RUAA-UVACH events. These alumni gatherings offer a venue for former students to reconnect with classmates, batchmates, and teachers, jog their memories, and share their past and present life experiences. The primary objective of RUAA is to utilize the rich experiences of old college students for the current students' benefit and progress. The former students support the members' development on a global, social, and technical level.

The future of Rohilkhand University is as bright as its illustrious past. Our former students have achieved success in every field. GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The University is one of the premier institutions of higher learning in Northern India, having 587affiliated/constituent colleges and catering to the educational needs of rural and urban populations spread over nine districts for the past 45 years. The institution's vision and mission are impregnated in the values and participative





decision-making processes of MJP Rohilkhand University. University's vision and mission statements are reflected in governance as follows-

- All academic, administrative, extra-curricular, and co-curricular-related tasks are completed in complete conformity with the Vision and Mission Statements.
- The University has a clear administrative hierarchy, with the Vice Chancellor as the executive head followed by the Registrar, Controller Examination, Finance Officer, Deans, and Heads who carry out administrative and academic activities of the university.
- The mission of the university reflects' in participation of teachers in decision-making bodies viz. Board of Studies, Academic Council, Executive Council, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, etc. This maintains the complete autonomy of the University and provides intellectual freedom.
- The university has developed many Cells and Directorates imbued in the vision. The Directorate of Research, Directorate of International Relation, Directorate of Social and Corporate Relation, Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation, as well as more than eleven Cells/Centres like IQAC, Atal Centre for AI, Grass Root Innovation Centre, Centre of Excellence for Multilingual Studies, Centre of Excellence for Women Studies, IDP and Ranking Cell, Teacher's Re-skilling Cell, Women Grievance Cell, IPR Cell, Institution Innovation Council, Consultancy Cell, Hospitality & Experiential Learning, etc.
- As our vision states for excellence in research, the university has created the 'Directorate of Research (DoR)' equipped with RMS, which has created an environment for undertaking multidisciplinary research with the potential for commercialization. DoR proliferates research through publication, research compendium, and securing research grants.
- As our mission states 'to equip the students to make effective contributions to society and economy', the university has established 'The Directorate of International Relations, which facilitates research collaborations, exchange of research ideas, students, and cultural exchange programs. The Directorate has paved the way for MoU between universities and various national and International Institutions.
- With IPR Cell initiatives, innovative ideas of faculty and students have fetched 76 patents in the past five years.

- University has implemented a Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in all the courses. It enhances the learner-centric approach and allows flexibility in education.
- To empower the students, a well-structured curriculum and the use of pedagogical tools with smart boards exist. Value-added programs, workshops, and seminars are conducted regularly, leading to the holistic development of students.
- The university ensures maximum placement of students through T&P Cell and promotes start- ups through Rohilkhand Incubation Foundation.
- The university has offices like the Student Welfare, Proctor Office, Admission Cell, Sports Council, and others in its formal structure vested with powers and autonomy for meeting action- oriented objectives aligned with the mission.
- To nurture the social values amongst the students and teachers, University has adopted two villages, namely Dohria and Mudia Ahmadnagar. Time to time Blood Donation Camps, Covid awareness and vaccination camps, and health checkups are arranged by the health centre of the university.

The effective leadership

The devolution of Functions, Functionaries, Funds and Feedback to the university are laid down by the State Government as per The U.P. State University Act, 1973. The functions of the university as expounded in the Act are to provide course of study, conduct examination and award degrees, promote and facilitate research.collaborate with educational. professional, community and other interests and to manage and administer the property, funds and assets. The functionaries exist in form of various Councils. Boards, Committees, Directorate, Centers, and Cells. Funds are generated through various government and non-government schemes. Stakeholder Feedback is used by Departments/Committee/Head/Dean for vision/restructuring of syllabi, etc. for continuous quality enhancement.

The university practices decentralization and participative management in policy formulation and in its execution both in academics and administration. It has a mechanism for division of work, delegating powers, fixing responsibility and providing operational autonomy to all functionaries. The Hon'ble Governor of the State being the ex-officio Chancellor of all the State Universities is the Supreme head from whom University receives regular guidance. The Vice Chancellor is the



administrative and academic head of the University. The Deans/Heads/Directors have been delegated powers with administrative control at the departmental level. The Vice-Chancellor deliberate with the Registrar/ Controller-of-Examination/Finance Officer and the decentralization and participative management is practiced through office orders, notifications, and work allotment. Statutory bodies viz. Executive Council/ Academic Council/Faculty Board/Board-of-Studies/ Finance Committee/Examination Committee constituted and task is further distributed through sub committees, such as, Admission Committee, Sports Council, Departmental Committee, Disciplinary Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Purchase Committee, Building Committee and through various Directorates/Cells/Centers. The governance of the affiliated colleges is decentralized through College Management System ensuring transparency and accountability.

The Finance Officer of the university controls the budgetary and financial issues. All Heads of teaching and non-teaching departments are vested with financial powers up to a prescribed limit. All big-tickets items are purchased through GeM portal. The major financial decisions are taken by Finance Committee followed by Executive Council on recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor thereby creating a pyramid reflecting true picture of decentralization and participative management practice in university.

For execution at academic level, meetings are convened for faculty, officers/employees time to time under the Chairmanship of the Vice-Chancellor. The teaching departments work independently without any administrative impediment and there are Departmental Committees and Board of studies in each department to take decisions. The decisions are notified to students through notice board and delegated to CRs heading various e-groups.

Leadership is reflected in interacting with its stakeholders. Students interact through Mentormentee and Student Council, which exists in each department, with their faculty members and Head. All other stakeholders such as parents, alumni, people from industry and members of the public are allowed to meet the University Authorities/Teaching Departments for getting their problems resolved. Leadership is also reflected in reinforcing a culture of excellence. IQAC regularly collects data from different departments regarding faculty publications, seminars participation, and organization of seminars/workshops/lecture series/etc.

Strategy Development and Deployment Academic Excellence:

The university has framed a well-articulated roadmap of teaching and learning to accomplish its vision and mission. It aims at providing multidimensional quality education of comparably high standards in a reasonably inclusive manner and at an affordable-to-all cost structure. Inculcation of entrepreneurial skills through experiential learning is practiced in most programs. Revision of the curriculum is done based on feedback from stakeholders. The university has adopted the CBCS pattern of evaluation.

Research and Innovation:

The university has established a Directorate of Research which promotes quality research in all streams and has developed linkages with prestigious institutes/research laboratories in India and abroad viz. IVRI/CARI/John Carroll University-Ohio, TECC- Taiwan, etc. Seed money is provided to faculty members for viable projects. To foster the spirit of innovation and entrepreneurship among students, the university has established GRIC and RIF with an aim to nurture them in their pursuit to become scalable and sustainable enterprises.

Industry Interface:

To update the students and make them 'industry ready', T&P Cell arranges Industrial visits/In-industry training/ Soft-Skill program/Technical-Training/Career-Guidance/ invited lectures from industry, and conducts placement drive regularly.

Community Outreach Program:

The university, in its commitment to meet its social responsibility, has adopted two villages, namely, Dohria and Mudia-Ahmad Nagar. Blood-Donation, Health-Checkup Camps, etc., are regularly conducted. University organized 31 Covid-Vaccination Camps, benefiting 2528 students/employees/nearby community. Under its self-financed Zero-TB-digital platform, the university cares for more than 200 TB patients through dot monitoring. The university conducts gender sensitization programs and, thus, has established, the Centre of Excellence for Women Studies, which nurtures social values amongst stakeholders.

Admission and Evaluation process:

Both the admission and evaluation process of the university has been transformed into online mode deploying College Management System (CMS) software. This has resulted in revolutionary change by giving equal opportunity to all for seeking admission and by minimizing a number of days in declaring results.





Capacity Building:

The university aims to develop and strengthen skills, abilities, and resources at three levels. At the individual level, the Teachers Re-skilling Cell has been established, which organizes TTP for Aganwadi, Primary, Secondary, and Higher Education Teachers. At the organizational level, the focus is on curriculum development, MoUs, modernization of governance, and management of constituent and affiliated colleges. At the environmental level, agricultural waste management, water harvesting, plantation, herbal gardening, green campus, etc., are some of the pioneering works leading to capacity building.

Successfully Implemented Activity:

As a strategic initiative to promote quality research Directorate of Research of international standards has been established. Free Plagiarism check using the latest version of iThenticate of Turnitin is open to students/ teachers/guides. To promote research, a travel grant of Rs. 25,000/- is given from TWF to attend International Conferences. To motivate young researchers, a provision of a stipend of Rs 12,000/- pm has been made. As an outcome, the university has in its credit 76 patents and more than 69 projects funded by DST, UGC, ICAR, MHRD, Govt. of UP, etc.

Functioning of the institutional bodies

The Hon'ble Governor of the State is the Chancellor of the university. The Vice Chancellor is the Chief Administrative and Academic Officer of the University who is assisted by the Registrar, Controller of Examination, Finance Officer, Faculty Deans, Heads, DSW, Dean (Academics) in administrative, academic, examination and financial matters. The University has clearly defined and duly constituted statutory bodies, Executive Council for policy and governance, Academic Council for academic decisions, Finance Committee for administration and monitoring of annual budget, accounts and financial estimates.

These Executive Council (EC) and Academic Council (AC) have participation of stakeholders both from within the University and from the UP Govt as Governor's nominee. The various committees viz, Research Development Committee, Purchase Committee, Anti-ragging Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Enquiry Committee, Committee Against Sexual Harassment, Disciplinary Committee are in place to enable the university to run an effective administration. The University follows UGC/AICTE/NCTE/CCIM regulations adopted by State Govt for recruitment of teaching staff and UP Govt Statutes and guidelines for non-teaching staff.

For service matters of both teaching and non-teaching staff, the same Statutes are observed. Recruitment of teaching staff is done against open advertisement followed by screening and selection committee duly constituted as per provisions of UP State University Act, 1973 and as per UP Govt reservation guidelines.

Promotions for teaching staff is based on Career Advancement Scheme of UGC and for non-teaching employees is done through the Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC). The University strictly follows the Uttar Pradesh Govt Financial Rules for all its financial practices and procedures and majority of purchases are done through GeM portal.

Specific Policies, Procedures and EC approved proposals implemented:

- IPR Policy for creation and protection of intellectual property of the university/affiliated colleges.
- Teachers Reskilling Policy for teachers training programs.
- Periodic training in RMS, CMC, use of university resources etc.
- Policy on managing e-waste
- Innovation and Start-up Policy
- > IT Policy
- Medical Cover: Medi-claim policy of IFFCO-TOKIO is provided to all employees with 100%contribution by the university. Employees of the university, their wards, including spouses, and parents are covered under the scheme.
- Residential facility: Type I, and II quarters for employees and Type III, and IV quarters for teachers are provided.
- Day Care facility: To help the women, especially the visitor and the employee, a daycare arrangement is provided at a profit no loss basis.
- GPF/CPF facility: It is provided to all employees as per their entitlement. All those who opted for GPF before 2005 are entitled to a pension.

- Employee Welfare Fund: The university has created two types of welfare funds, namely, TWF for Teachers and SWF for non-teaching employees. Lump sum medical grants/loans are provided a case-to-case basis to meet major surgery and hospitalization expenses.
- Anti-Plagiarism Policy for mandatory plagiarism checks and certification in all academic and research activities.
- DSCR procedure as a potential window for creating social and corporates linkages.
- Atal Centre for AI to foster AI based interdisciplinary research & development for societal and national benefits.

DIR initiative to develop international relations with HE institutes of different countries.

- Admission Policy for campus and college-based courses through Entrance Test/direct admission following reservation policy.
- Procedure for attending FDP/ Refresher/Orientation/ Short-term courses of UGC.
- Zero Waste Charter for plastic-free, water conservation, energy audit etc. for eco-sustainable green campus.
- Social Responsibility policy for adoption of villages, schools, for blood donation/vaccination/TB eradication/health campaigns etc.
- Quality Policy
- Gender Policy providing equal opportunity, equality and gender justice

Faculty Empowerment Strategies

The University has a well-defined performance appraisal system both for teaching and non-teaching staff. For teachers, promotions are done through CAS as per UGC guidelines. To promote non-teaching staff, the university adheres to State government rules. 100% of promotions, due to date, have been done.

Welfare measures for all Employees:

- Medical facility: The University has a Health Centre with two qualified full-time doctors and requisite paramedical and nursing staff. Medical specialists for chest, orthopedics, and gynae visit on designated days for consultation.
- House & Vehicle Loan facility: For all employees at an interest rate much lower than the scheduled banks.

- GSLI Benefit: 100% of the teaching and non-teaching staff are covered under this Group Saving Linked Insurance scheme of LIC.
- Children Fee Concession Policy: 100% tuition fee is waived for wards of teaching and non-teaching if taken admission in campus-run courses.
- Post Office & Banking facility: The campus has a separate building for Post Office and for two banks-UBI and BOB. The BOB provides a digital banking platform to all employees and students.
- Sports facility: World-class recreation and sports facility is available for students and staff with turf track stadium, Gym, Shooting, indoor Badminton and Volleyball court, Boxing ring, Physiotherapy Centre, etc.
- Library facility: RFID-enabled Central Library facility is available for all. Besides this, each department also has its own departmental library facility.
- Financial Assistance for Teachers: Seed money is provided for viable research projects Financial assistance of Rs 25,000/- as a travel grant for attending international conferences. Provision of Rs 12,000/- per month as a stipend for young scholars of Ph.D. program.

Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The University has developed strategies for mobilizing resources and ensuring transparency in the financial management of the Institution. University has made necessary provisions for the efficient use of available funds for each academic year. For various expenditures, fixed deposits, and current and saving accounts are maintained. The University has well-formulated financial policies which ensure effective and optimal utilization of finances for academic, administrative, and development purposes, which also reflects in the university's vision and mission. At the end of the financial year, the budget is prepared well in advance after considering the requirements of every department. All departments have fixed budgets based on requirements such as equipment, consumables, and furniture. The University has laid down procedures, in accordance with the Financial Handbook and State government ordinances, for the purchase and procurement of materials and services, which are strictly followed. All transactions are made online to make the system efficient and fair.

There is a full-fledged finance and accounts section, headed by a full-time Finance officer appointed by the UP government, which monitors all financial matters. An active Finance Section not only strives to garner





monetary support in the form of grants from various agencies but also efficiently looks after, monitors, and facilitates effective mobilization of resources thus received and generated and their proper utilization.

Various sources of funds are: Entrance fee

- · Admission fee Hostel Fee Examination fee.
- Affiliation fees from colleges Interest on FDRs
- Central & State Government schemes
- Alumni fee and Corporate Social Responsibility Fund etc. Consultancy fee.
- 41 new programs and one Ph.D. (Part-Time) program fee

Continuous efforts are made by University for fund generation through various government schemes like RUSA, and TEQIP. University received a grant of Rs 20 crores under RUSA and a grant of Rs 10 crores under TEQIP in the last 5 years.

The university regularly receives funds from agencies like UGC, DST, AICTE, UP Centre of Excellence, etc., for various departments. Apart from this, under Corporate Social Responsibility Funds, the university has received a grant of Rs 25 Lakhs from B L Agro Industries, Rs 5 Lakhs from Rama Shyama Industries, 150 (approx.) Lakhs for different software development from HDFC, 57.60 Lakhs from ICICI for organic remediation, 12 Lakhs for Aganwadi scheme, five lakhs for plantation and landscaping by Khushboo Nursery, 5 Lakhs for micro-irrigation, 12 Lakhs for tube well, etc.

The University aims at recognizing the optimal utilization of resources and the mobilization of new resources as the priority area. Optimization is ensured through cost-cutting strategies as follows:

- Installation of solar energy panels across the university led to saving of approximately 1.5 crores/ annum.
- All entrance tests are conducted in online mode, which saves the cost of papers.
- Recycling and reuse of waste by the waste management system.
- Online Ph.D. viva and BOS meetings are conducted, leading to the saving of TA/DA of experts.
- The number of pages in Answer books are reduced from 32 to 24.
- All purchases are made through GeM portal depending on the amount involved and total transparency is ensured.
- 7. Institutional Values and Best Practices Gender Equity

For Gender Equity and sensitization, the university has taken proactive measures at all levels. Theuniversity is aware of the UGC Guidelines on Gender Championship and similar guidelines of sister organizations like the draft equity action plan of ICAR. The university ensures equal participation of all genders in all academic activities, including classes, group discussions, competitions, and curricular activities.

The University campus is physically and socially gender friendly; especially providing adequate and suitable facilities to women students and faculty. The University protects and addresses the needs of woman students. The focus of teaching at the university is to upgrade poor or weak students and to identify weaknesses in students to motivate them to come in line with other students. The university does not discriminate against students and faculty in terms of caste, race, religion, culture, sex or other factors as enshrined in the Indian Constitution Article 14, 15, and 23.

Safety and Security

- University has high-quality CCTV cameras as "watch dog" installed all over the campus to ensure safety inside the campus.
- Adequate security forces are deployed on the university campus (24 x7), which is extended to hostels and residential areas and wherever there is a sensitive point.
- University regulates the entry of students into the hostel, and there is an arrangement for visit of quardians or parents in the hostels.

Counseling/Consultancy Services

- University has established the Centre of Excellence for Women Studies to upgrade knowledge from National/International perspectives. The Centre and Law Department provides advisory/consultancy services on gender issues.
- University has constituted a special cell named "Women Grievances Cell (WGC)" as per "Vishaka Guidelines" to address the students' grievances related to academic, and non- academic matters or any matter related to the workplace.
- Through, the mentor-mentee system, counseling related to academic and non-academic matters is provided to students.

Girls' Common Room and Hostels

There are four hostels, namely Maitreyi Girl Hostel, Savitri Girls Hostel, Laxmi bai Kelkar Girls Hostel, and Manorama Girls Hostel for girls on the main





campus with an approximate capacity of approx. 500 female students. Each hostel is provided with Common Room.

All the Hostels are equipped with Water Coolers, Xerox machines, Sports Facilities, Canteen, Mess Facility, Television, Sanitary napkin machines, and Vehicle Parking space.

Day Care Centre

Day-Care Centre, namely "Vatsalaya," has been established in the university to provide supervision and care for infants and young children during the day time which relieves parents who work for different activities in the university and students or parents who visit the university campus on different assignments. A lady caretaker has been appointed to look after the Centre. Facilities like games, a big space (verandah), a cycle and a toilet are provided.

Other Information

- University has also organized various women-centric programs and also conducted different programs related to gender equity. There is a provision in the university for Post Graduate (PG) Diploma in Women Empowerment and Development.
- There is a Health Centre supported by a Doctor and Paramedical Staff which provides medical checkups and first-aid facilities.

MANAGEMENT OF DEGRADABLE & NON-DEGRA-DABLE WASTE

University has a strong dedication to moral principles, and that is why moral principles place a strong emphasis on environmental conservation and methods for long-term sustainability. This emphasis on environmental activities culminated in selecting Eco-consciousness and Sustainability as the institution's primary subjects. The institution encourages all departments to participate in various activities that promote environmental preservation and sustainability. It is also making the university a distinctive institution with zero waste. The impact of these initiatives can be seen as

- Good Health and Well Being
- Clean water and sanitation
- Affordable and clean energy
- Life on land

Waste management:

The university has taken up various initiatives to maintain an environment-friendly campus. The campus is full of greenery and is kept clean and tidy. The gardens, lawns, and plantations inside the campus are maintained by a dedicated group of caretakers, sweepers, and housekeeping staff. The Green Audit is organized in our Institution, and various measures have been taken to implement the suggestions provided in the audit. The university implements effective waste management through waste segregation and recycling of waste.

Solid waste management:

The university implements solid waste management by enforcing waste segregation rules. Dustbins are placed in, the laboratory, restroom, and canteen and at different locations on the campus. Sweepers are allotted to each floor which manages all the waste generated on the campus. All waste/garbage from the university campus and hostel is segregated at the source and disposed of properly. The wet waste from the hostels/ canteen is given away to biofertilizer plants for making eco-friendly fertilizers.

Liquid waste management:

The university follows a systematic procedure for proper management and disposal of liquid waste. The wet waste from the campus, hostels, and canteen is given away to biofertilizer plants for making eco- friendly fertilizers. The sewage water of the campus is being directed in such a way that most of the water is then used for gardening and other purposes.

E-waste management:

The university has undertaken several E-waste Management initiatives to create an eco-friendly environment on campus. E-waste such as computers and their peripherals are upgraded regularly to continue usage and to avoid wastage E-waste such as electronic components (plastic/metallic) is handed over to agencies that help recycle these materials as per the MOU with external agencies. The university made an MOU in this regard with a government-approved agency, and disposal is done through them.

Biomedical waste management:

Bacterial, viral, and fungal contamination is autoclaved before it is disposed of infectious waste is properly covered and stored. Biosafety and bio-waste management subjects are also included in the course curriculum, so students learn about waste management

Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management:

Hazardous chemicals are properly labelled. Every lab has its safety and working guidelines for the proper handling of chemicals and other hazardous waste.





Institutional efforts/initiatives in providing an inclusive environment

The university has a zero-tolerance policy towards discrimination and violation of the dignity of fellow students or other members of the MJPRU community on the basis of caste, religion, region, disability, gender, sexual orientation, and race. The University cares for its students and takes measures to ensure their safety and security. The Institute has all forms of support services, administrative mechanisms, and rules and regulations to make the safety and security systems work for the welfare of its students. University provides a conducive environment in general settings of the academic environment. With reference to Cross-Cultural Diversity, University established an Indo –Iranian Studies center in 2012. It functions with the help of Iran Culture House, New Delhi, and imparts certificate courses in Persian language and culture. It has a rich library for students, including books, videos, and diverse content on Persian history, culture, art, and language. A number of lectures are organized in this center for students.

The National Service Scheme is a Central Scheme of the Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. It provides an opportunity to the student to take part in various government-led community service activities and programmes. It promotes various adventure activities and infuses a sense of love toward society, region, and country. The various activities enhance leadership qualities, fraternity, team spirit, and risk-taking capacity, leading to the improvement of physical and mental strength with exposure to new vocational possibilities. NSS volunteers work to ensure that everyone who is needy gets help to enhance their standard of living and lead a life of dignity. In doing so, volunteers learn from people in villages how to lead a good life despite scarce resources. It also provides help in natural and manmade disasters by providing food, clothing, and first aid to the disaster's victims. Besides these, through youth festivals, cultural activities, and equal opportunities to all students without any discrimination of caste and creed and the socio-economic status university is promoting cultural and socioeconomic diversity.

The University has a 'Wall of Honour', honouring the contribution & sacrifice of the brave souls protecting the Nation. Organizing various awareness rallies, seminars, group discussions, and government campaigns in collaboration with the Tehsil office, Government

and Non-Government Hospitals, Agricultural offices, Industries, Banks, NGOs, etc., is an excellent example of major extension activities that the university participates in. On campus, there are flex boards with information about environmental awareness, responsibilities, and values. The university is effectively acting as a catalyst in the community to uphold peace and promote national unity. The institution goes above and above to create a welcoming environment for all staff and students. To establish an appropriate environment with tolerance and harmony towards linguistic, cultural, regional, communal, socio-economic, and other diversities. Commemorative days like International Women's Day, National Integration Day, World Poetry Day, Yoga Day, World Cancer Day, World AIDS Day along with many regional festivals are celebrated.

Sensitization of students and employees of the institution to the constitutional obligations: values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens

Programmes are organized time to time to sensitize faculty and employees for moral values, rights and duties. Additionally, sensitization of students and employees of the Institution to the constitutional obligations is done through curriculum as well as through extra-curricular activities. Many of the subjects offered have topics which sensitize the students about the constitutional obligations. The University also organize seminars, workshops which also address the know how about Right to Information, Sexual harassment and gender equity. The university takes numerous measures byplanning various activities to educate staff and students about their constitutional rights and obligations. Students are made aware of their accountability to their parents, their education, and society at large. Intellectual ability, moral rectitude, social responsibility, and a service-oriented spiritual orientation are all openly mentioned in the university's wide range of programmes. The university organizes events to raise public awareness of issues that are really essential to run a value- oriented society like Communal harmony, environmental protection, drug abuse, health and hygiene, disaster management, women's empowerment, and democracy.

The Context:

Cultural heritage is the legacy of physical artifacts and intangible attributes of a group or society that are inherited from past generations, maintained in the present, and bestowed for the benefit of future generations. Considering that India is one of the most ethnically and religiously diverse countries of the world, with the most ancient culture and civilization, it becomes imperative on our part to preserve and disseminate the nuances of such heritage





into people's consciousness. Rohilkhand region was named after Rohillas - the diaspora of Pashtun ancestry who lived and ruled this place.

The Practice:

The University takes pride in fulfilling its commitment to society by protecting and preserving the evidence of history and culture by the establishment of the Panchala Museum. The Rohilkhand region was known by the name of Panchala during ancient Mahabharat period. Born in this region, the character of Draupadi in Mahabharat was also known as Panchali. The University, by naming its Museum after the region "Panchal," has made a humble effort to revive the lost glory of that bygone era and to keep the history alive in the memory of the Nation.

The Panchala museum houses antiquities of the Neolithic age to the modern period and photographs of monuments of the ancient and medieval past of the Rohilkhand region. It has several galleries such as Abhaipur Excavation Gallery, Terracotta Gallery, Textile Gallery, Rama Shankar Rawat Gallery, Surendra Mohan Mishra Gallery, photo Gallery and Ahichhatra Diorama, etc. The Museum has a small Archaeo- chemistry laboratory, which is used for cleaning, preservation and conservation of coins and artefacts of copper and iron, manuscripts and bone/ivory objects.

The material vestiges collected from the excavations at the Chalcolithic (Ochre-coloured Pottery culture) and Early Iron Age site of Abhaipur (Bisalpur, Pilibhit) and the first evidence of mortuary practice in the form of two human burials of Painted Grey Ware culture of north India are priceless. Dated back to 3100 years before present (BP) by Carbon-14 method, these burials of an adult and a sub-adult belong to the Later Vedic Age, when it is widely believed, cremation of dead was in vogue. The Museum exhibits the pictures of monuments and places of historical significance from the entire Rohilkhand region. Some of these are:

- Fortified Ancient City of Ahichhatra (Capital of north Panchala), Ramnagar, Bareilly
- 2. Tomb of Hafiz Rahmat Khan, Bareilly
- 3. Begam Wali Masjid, Aonla, Bareilly
- 4. Raza Library (Hamid Manzil Palace), Rampur
- Tomb of Ikhlas Khan, Budaun
- Thakur Roshan Singh Smarak, Nawada Darobast Village, Shahjahanpur

Places of religious interests:

 Free Will Baptist Church of India, Bareilly4. Syed Bukhari Tomb, Budaun

- Figurines in the Panchala Museum, 2012, by A.K. Singh and Pankaj Sharma
 - The donation of ancient coins and artefacts by private antique collectors is the greatest testimony of this trust. There are three galleries in the Panchala Museum that exhibit prized collections of Shri Rama Shankar Rawat, Shri Surendra Mohan Mishra and Shri Sanjay Agrawal.
 - The Panchal Museum has become a centre of attraction for tourists, researchers, students and visiting dignitaries. About 500 to 600 students of the area are visiting the museum every year.
 - To provide a platform for quality education to the under privileged.
 - To develop it as a Model School in the nearby area.

The Context:

The existing educational system does not cater well to the needs of the marginalised section in terms of their latent potential making it difficult for them to handle the uncertainties of life. The University has stepped in to bridge this gap with all its resources human and material for the upliftment of society. The teachers and students of Department of BEd/MEd were visiting the school and involved in teaching/learning at school being run by freedom fighters. The School management was highly impressed by the involvement and dedication of University staff and students. They decided to hand over the reins of the school to university with the hope and faith that it will bloom into a college one day. Thus Pt. Dinanath Mishra Inter College, which was being run in the name of freedom fighter, was adopted by University in 1996, to fulfill the needs of the marginalized section of the society. The students here comprise of low income group, girls, first generation learners from different caste and community where education is out of reach due to one or the other reason. Along with providing them quality education, this initiative seeks to instill in the kids a strong sense of ethical and humanitarian ideals, community development with leadership skills.

The Practice:

The University apart from funding the college for infrastructure augmentation and maintenance also appoints the Principal, teachers and supporting staff. The Department of Education of the University sends its students and faculty members to the College for the mandatory training programme under its curriculum. The teachers of different departments of University like Department of Plant Science, Business Administration, Law, etc also visit from time to time and deliver lectures



or have discussions on topics relevant for the wholesome development of students. The engineering and science faculty students of University visit the college and train college students in computer lab and other labs. Educational visits are arranged for the students of college to the Research labs, Central Library, Botanical Gardens, Museum, Sports Complex, etc of the University campus with the objective of motivating them for higher education. Regular health check-up camps are organised for the students and their family members.

Evidence of Success:

"Success isn't about how much money you make; it's about the difference you make in people's lives." This quote aptly summarises the contribution being made by University in the lives of marginalized section of society by adopting the College. Specifically the following highlights the evidence of success: The number of students enrolled in the college is around 400. After adoption the school reached the level of High School and now Inter College (Class XII). The nominal fee structure attracts students from diverse social and economic background. Its co-educational status has facilitated the enrollment of girls from adjoining areas to pursue studies till Intermediate, which have otherwise remained confined to the four walls of the house. The pass percentage in Class X Board examination is above 95 percent and in Class XII Board examination is around 90 percent.

Approximately 93 percent of the Class XII pass out students have gone for higher studies. This number is highly significant keeping in mind the fact that most of the students are from marginalized section of society who would have become drop outs without the support of this college. Many of the alumni of the college are today in respectable government and private jobs. The students have started participating in different science exhibitions and other competitions at the district level.

All such concerted efforts have resulted in many positive outcomes. Important days and cultural events are celebrated in the presence of University students and faculty. Fifty four students of the College have been adopted by twelve faculty members of the University for their present and future education. The Vice Chancellor of the University has donated Rs 2.5 lakhs as a corpus fund to initiate a scholarship of Rs. 1000 to the girl who tops the UP Board Intermediate examination every year.

Problems encountered:

The transformation of a building into an Institution of learning was by no means an easy task. Yet with the persistent efforts of the University, the initial reluctance of the people to send their children for education has steadily vanished. It has further made our resolve "Charaiveti Charaiveti" stronger

CONCLUSION

MJP Rohilkhand University is committed towards qualitative academic and research work keeping in mind the upliftment of the community at large. In this direction the University has continuously made efforts with the establishment of several cells like RUAA - Rohilkhand University Alumni Association, Atal Centre for Artificial Intelligence, Pandit DeenDayal Upaddhaya Shodhpeeth, Teachers' Reskilling Cell, TEQIP -III, NIF - National Incubation Foundation, Grassroots Innovation Centre, Consultancy Cell, NIF - National Incubation Foundation. IPR Cell, Centre for Excellence for Women. Under these heads the University has catered to several outreach and extension activities programs so as to provide an environment with a futuristic approach to development. Our alumni association is active in providing funding for projects and other contributions towards placement, training programs etc.

The university can boast of producing some prestigious stalwarts who have made a mark in various academic, corporate, administrative fields, performing arts and so on and is consistently on the road to excellence.

Concluding Remarks:

In compliance with the Vision and Mission of the University, the teaching methodology and paedagogy includes the latest in the academic world by providing the state of the art instructional equipments and tools.

Introduction of NEP 2020 has been a stepping stone in this direction. State of the art facilities like sports stadium, indoor and outdoor gym and eco friendly infrastructure keeps pace with the healthy and hygienic environment.

Needless to mention that the strengths of our university lies in the extension activities as well such as Zero TB campaign where 'adopt a patient' to care for them so as to eradicate the deadly disease, has gained momentum and acceptance so far. Apart from this several students have created a mark for themselves in social work – NSS. Mr. Mohit Sharma Ex-student, received the President's award for the same.

The strategic location of the university will help the satellite areas to be associated with it and can lead to literate and educate the population in these areas there by contributing in the social and economic progress of society in particular and country in general.

DEENA NATH MISHRA INTER COLLEGE AN INSTITUTIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY TO HELP UNPRIVILEGED

Objectives:

The practice is started with the following objectives:

- To prepare a platform to give equal opportunity to the marginalized children of society.
- To provide equal education to the marginalized children of society.
- To expose the children to the different institutions of further education.
- To develop the overall personality of the students.
- To create skills in the students which leads to employability
- To develop the school as a Model School of Practice in the nearby area.

The Context:

The majority of children in the country still lack access to basic amenities including access to education, clean drinking water, and proper sanitation, among others, and they continue to struggle with developmental issues. The goal of MJP Rohilkhand University is to positively impact society and the country by offering quality education to underprivileged youngsters. The programme was started to benefit society and promote socioeconomic growth, both of which will indirectly aid in nation-building.

Along with providing them with quality education and leadership abilities, this initiative seeks to inculcate in the kids a strong sense of ethical and humanitarian ideals. It emphasizes integrating curriculum learning with volunteer work, encourages students to build their leadership skills through such learning, serving, reflecting on, and sharing, and aids them in understanding their distinctive uniqueness and development goals.

Deena Nath Mishra Inter College was established in 1996 to cater to the need of a marginalized section of society. The students in this school come from marginalized sections of society. The student comprises the low economic group, first-generation learners, girls, and

students from different castes and communities where education is out of reach due to one or the other reason. MJP Rohilkhand university took an initiative to not only start the school for such students but also to support them in all aspects.

The Practice:

- The school is fully funded and maintained by the MJP Rohilkhand University apart from the appointment of teachers of different school subjects in the school. The university also appoints administrative officials comprising Principal Office staff and supporting staff.
- The university teacher training department remains in continuous contact with the Pt. Deena Nath Mishra Inter College and to get for with the University teachers the pupil teachers of the teacher training department offer their services to the school for continuous four months in the mid of the session.
- There is an old proverb that states, "India is a rich country but Indians are poor," which suggests that although India is rich in resources, we are unable to fully utilize them due to a lack of knowledge and education. The biggest obstacles are ignorance and poverty. Our youth are robbed of education in rural areas mostly because of a lack of infrastructure and poverty. Therefore, despite a significant rate of talent, there is student dropout from the courses. Our faculty members have long thought of and devised this practice of adopting deserving and deserving pupils to reduce the dropout rate of students. The goal of this practice is to minimize the dropout rate of the students in the course.
- Regular health camps are organized for the students and their family members. These camps help in identifying their underline diseases of them. The university teachers adopt the weaker students and help them to provide balanced diets and medicines.





Apart from this, the students of Pt. Deena Nath Mishra Inter College called for visits to the different departments and laboratories, libraries, and botanical gardens to not only observe them but also to motivate them to come to this institution for their higher studies.

Evidence of Success:

The enrollment in the school has raised from 150 to 500 (need to be updated for this session from school). There is a regular celebration of important days in the school. The school building

- has attained a satisfactory status and stands as a model school in the area around.
- ➤ The nominal fee structure allows students from any economic group to come to learn in school without any hindrance. The co-education status has allowed the girl children of the area around to have a center of learning till intermediate. The students of the college have started participating in the different science exhibitions and competitions of the district. The university facilitates such students who participate in such activities.

Another target of the University is to develop religious harmony among the masses through projecting the collective consciousness towards a shared culture among followers of all religious sects.

Panchal museum is having the objective to provide a sense of community and place by celebrating a collective heritage, offering a great way to get to know the history of Rohilkhand Region.

The Context:

A society and nation are known by its heritage, thus making heritage conservation indispensable for the cultural identification that renders sense of pride to the inhabitants of the region and citizens of the nation. Before independence, India remained oppressed for centuries under the rule of invaders who purposefully neglected its culture and civilization. Considering the point, that India is one of the most ethnically and religiously diverse nation of the world, with the most ancient culture and civilization, it becomes imperative to work towards preserving its unique historical and cultural heritage. Rohilkhand region was named after Rohillas- the diaspora from Pashtun ancestry who were welcomed in this place-making it an example of cultural integration, MJPRU Bareilly is a conglomeration of university departments and affiliated colleges spread in the region of Rohilkhand which covers nine districts namely Bareilly, Moradabad, Sambhal,

Rampur, Bijnore, Amroha, Budaun, Pilibhit, and Shahjahanpur which lies on the upper Ganges alluvial plane and is bounded by the Ganges doab to the South and West, Uttarakhand to the North, Nepal to the East and the other reason to the South East.

The Practice:

The University takes pride in fulfilling its commitment towards society by protecting and preserving the evidences of history and culture and by spreading awareness among masses towards the valuable national antiquity and cultural heritage. The Rohilkhand region was known by the name of Panchal during ancient period. Born in this region, the character of Draupadi in Mahabharat was also known as Panchali. The University, by naming its

Museum after the region "Panchal" has made a humble effort to revive the lost glory of that bygone era and to keep the history alive in the memory of the Nation.

The establishment of Panchal Museum, which houses antiquities of Neolithic age to modern period and photographs related to monuments of the ancient and medieval past of the Rohilkhand region. It has several galleries such as Abhaipur Excavation Gallery, Terracotta Gallery, Textile gallery, Ramashanker Rawat Gallery, Surendra Mohan Mishra Gallery, Photo gallery, Ahichhatra Diorama etc. The museum has a small chemistry laboratory which is used for treatment and cleaning of coins, copper / iron objects, preservation and conservation of manuscript. The Museum houses the pictures of monuments and places of historical significance from the entire Rohilkhand region.



NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

INTRODUCTION

India, the land of the Ganga, Gautam and Gandhi, known as the spiritual teacher of the world, has always been glorifying inner piety, peace and perfection which can be achieved through the worship of God and service of mankind. Both the National Service Scheme (NSS) and the UNICEF are the organisations that are dedicated to the upliftment and service of the people especially women and children. After passing through various committees and conferences from 1950 onwards on the recommendations of Dr. C.D. Deshmukh, Prof. K.G. Saiyidain and Dr. D.S Kothari, the National Service Scheme was launched on September 24, 1969 by Dr. VKRV Rao, the then Education Minister of India. It was very significant that this scheme was started during the Gandhi Centenary Year as it was Gandhiji who inspired the Indian youth to participate in the movement for Indian independence and the social uplift of the down-trodden masses of the country. The Father of the Nation was of the view that "the first duty of the students should be, not to treat their period of study as one of the opportunities for indulgence in intellectual luxury, but for preparing themselves for final dedication in the service of those on whose back they were resting" He expected of the students to do "something positive so that the life of the villagers might be raised to a higher material and moral level.

OBJECTIVES

- (Understand the community in which they work;
- Understand themselves in relation to their community;
- Identify the needs and problems in the community in the solution of which they can be involved
- Develop among themselves a sense of social and civic responsibility.
- Apply their education in finding practical solution to individual and community problems
- Develop competence required for group living and sharing responsibilities;
- Gain skills in mobilising community participation;
- Acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude;

- Develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters; and
- Practice National Integration.

Activities under taken (2022-2023)-

The activities undertaken under the National Service Scheme (NSS) have included environment enrichment and conservation; health, family welfare and nutrition programmes: awareness creation programmes for the rights and status of women work in hospitals and welfare institutions, production oriented work like rodent control and pest management; weed control, soil testing and soil health care, promotion of co-operative societies, nonformal education, and assistance to local authorities in relief and rehabilitation work during natural calamities and national emergencies. These activities are done by an NSS unit of 100 volunteers throughout the academic session under Normal Activities programme during the prescribed period of 120 hours of social service.

A student can remain a volunteer in this scheme for the maximum period of two continuous years during which he or she has to do social work for 240 hours. Some specific projects are undertaken by the units under Special Camping programme which includes 10day Special Camps of 50 volunteers each or 50% of the total strength of students enrolled for Normal Activities programmes. While participating in these programmes the volunteers bear in mind the motto of NSS "NOT ME BUT YOU"-and a badge on his or her breast. The badge, designed after the wheel of the Konark Sun God temple, inspires the volunteers for social service all the eight prahars (eight spokes refer to eight prahars of time), with extreme enthusiasm (red colour refers to enthusiasm), taking the whole universe for a family (blue colour indicates the universe of which N.S.S., volunteer is only a part. This scheme is jointly sponsored and supervised by the Department of Youth Affair and Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development (now Ministry of Culture, Youth Affairs and Sports) Government of India and State Government through the NSS Regional Centre and the NSS Cell of the State Secretariate.

Under the governance and guidance of the Vice-Chancellor, the Programme Co-ordinator gets the programmes organised at the college level through the Programme Officers who work with the consent and approval o their principals. From time to time

and Orientation Centres (TOCs), Empanelled Training Institutes (ETI) of the respective states and universities.

CENTRAL LIBRARY

INTRODUCTION

Ith the establishment of university in 1975, an idea of a central library also emerged. But it could be actualized only after the university attained its residential character in 1985 and thus central library came into existence in a rudimentary form in the administrative block. In 1989, the then vice-chancellor Dr. B. B. Singh Bisen took an initiative to differentiate the library from other offices of the administrative block and appointed an O.S.D. especially for the library. Later on, it was decided that separate building for the library may be constructed. On 29th November, 1994 the then Chairman of UGC Prof. G. Ram Reddy laid the foundation stone of library building and on completion it was inaugurated by the then Governor and Chancellor of U.P. Shri Romesh Bhandari on 13th February, 1997. With the rapid development of the university, library needed much

more space therefore the then vice-chancellor Prof. Z.H. Zaidi took necessary step in 2003 for the expansion of building. The expanded portion was completed in 2005 and was inaugurated by the then Vice President of India Shri Bhairon Singh Shekhavat on 4th February, 2005. Besides this, departmental/seminar libraries are also established in some departments viz. Faculty of Engineering and Technology, Faculty of Education and Allied Sciences, Faculty of Management, Faculty of Law, Faculty of Social Science and Faculty of Science.
